(A Report for Charitable Activities)

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Background

We in SRHU as charitable organizations play a vital role in nurturing a culture of giving, supporting public welfare, and advancing collective interests. When aligned with government programs, these entities contribute meaningfully to national development. The right to establish such bodies—be they Trusts, Societies, or Companies—is safeguarded under Article 19(1) (c) of the Indian Constitution.

The definition of "charitable purpose" under Section 2(15) of the Income Tax Act includes efforts aimed at poverty alleviation, education, promotion of yoga, medical relief, preservation of the environment and heritage, and activities that serve the public at large. Over time, legislative changes have fine-tuned this definition.

The Himalayan Institute Hospital Trust is a society registered under the Society Registration Act 1860. The Society was founded by the great yogi, H.H. Dr. Swami Rama, in the year 1989. Today, the Society (HIHT) is engaged in multifarious activities in the field of research, education, health care, social and outreach.

The main aims and objectives of the Society are:

(a) To undertake activities and research programmes for the extension of knowledge in the fields of natural, social, and applied sciences, holistic medicine, preventive medicine, science of breath, psycho-physiology, nutrition, stress management, and cancer research & treatment.

(b) To set up a Charitable Hospital in a region between Rishikesh and Dehradun and/or elsewhere, to provide medical, surgical, pathological, radiological, ophthalmological, and other specialized facilities of high standard to the general public.

(c) To run, own, manage, and administer medical training centres, diagnostic centres, scan centres, nursing homes, hospitals, hostels, guest houses, clinics, dispensaries, maternity homes, child and family welfare centres, clinical pathological testing laboratories, x-ray and electrocardiogram, holistic health care facilities & medical research centres in India and abroad.

(d) To act as consultants and advisors to provide technical know-how, technical and allied services for the establishment, operation and improvement of nursing homes,

hospitals, clinics, medical institutions, medical centres, diagnostics centres, and laboratories in India, and to provide facilities for medical research & education.

(e) To organize exhibitions, lectures, seminars, conferences on the themes related to the field of education, culture, science, art, and other cultural & educational activities.

(f) To invite experts for lectures; on related and other themes, organize and conduct laboratory and field work in holistic, experiential learning, and other educational, scientific, cultural, or any other area of concern for the Society.

Health Care

Promotion of Education: Swami Rama Himalayan University has made significant commitment to education by providing scholarships for the students. This effort is to empower students to achieve their goals and contribute to the society development.

Health Initiatives: Swami Rama Himalayan University provides healthcare facilities for its employees and their families. Key initiatives are –

- **Free Medical Treatment** - All hospital facilities (except cosmetic surgery) will be provided free of cost to the employee, spouse, and two dependent children below the age of 21 years and dependent parents of the employee.
- **Health Benefit Policy** - The Health Benefit Policy shall be followed in concurrence with Immunization Policy of the University
- **Health Support** – Health services are provided to the community to ensure the good health status of the people and aware them with the available health care resources.

Community Health Camps: The University engaged in many health camps in the year 2024-25 benefitting the local people. The University also provided extended health care facilities to the weaker section of the community as follows:-

Free Eye Camp

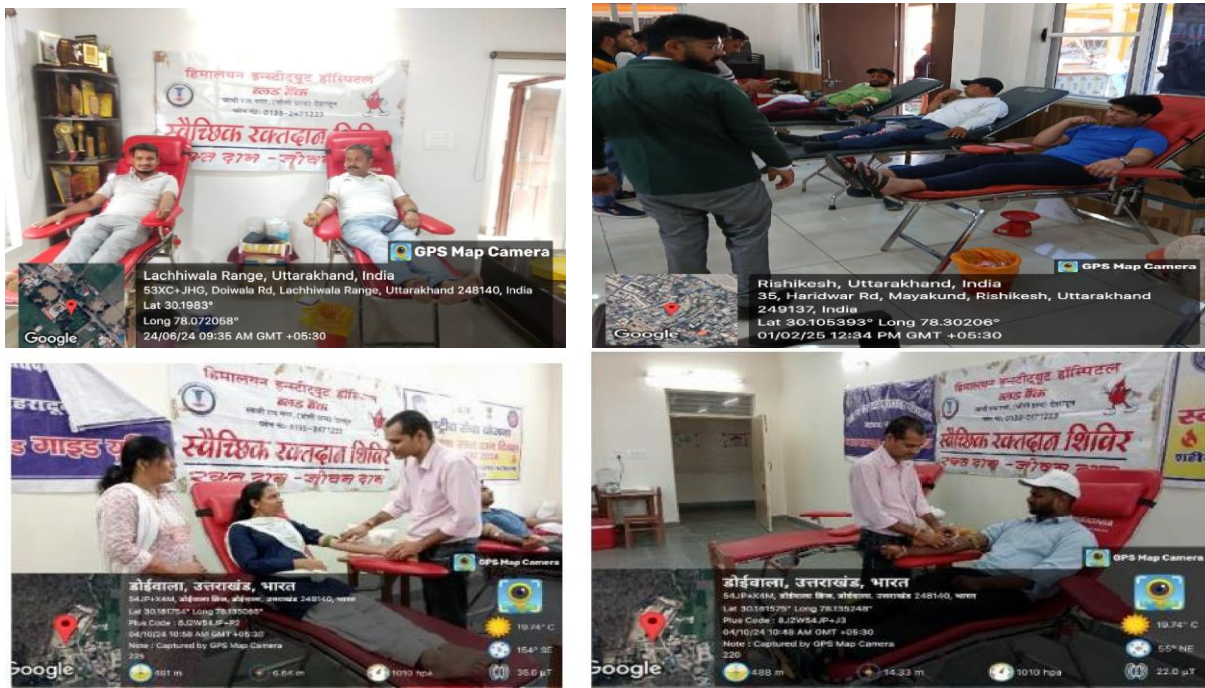


Figure 02: Images Presenting different timeline and place of blood donation camp conducted

Health Benefit Policy

1. Purpose

The purpose of the University Health Benefit Policy is to provide employees with comprehensive healthcare benefits that promote the well-being of both individuals and their families. These benefits are aimed at offering a supportive work environment that fosters good health, reduces absenteeism, and encourages overall employee satisfaction.

2. Scope

This policy applies to all employees not covered in ESI and their dependents, as defined by the terms of the specific health insurance plan provided by the university. Coverage details and benefits vary based on the employee's position, length of service, and other applicable factors.

2. Definitions

2.1 "University" means Swami Rama Himalayan University.

2.2 "Employee" means all employees getting a salary of > Rs. 15,000/- (i.e., Employees covered under ESI policy shall not be covered under this policy) appointed by the university and includes teaching faculty and other staff of the university/academic unit/constituent college.

2.3 "Family" means a family consisting of husband, wife, 2 dependent children (below the age of 21 Years), and dependent parents.

2.4 "Hospital" means Himalayan Hospital.

2.5 "Occupational Hazard" means any sickness/injury caused to an employee during the course of executing any job officially assigned to him.

2.6 "Entitlement" means entitlement of an employee corresponding to pay and salary.

2.7 "Medical Superintendent" means Medical Superintendent of the Hospital.

2.8 "Medical Board" means medical board constituted by the Himalayan Hospital.

3. Applicability

3.1 This Health Benefit Policy is applicable to all employees mentioned above in 2.2 and who have completed one year of satisfactory service with the University.

3.2 Employee, his/her dependent spouse, his/her 02 (two) dependent children below the age of 21 years and his/her dependant parents will be covered under this policy.

3.3 In case where both husband and wife are working with the University, then the parents of both the employees will be covered under this policy.

4. Entitlement and extent of medical benefits

4.1 The following medical benefits/facilities will be available to the employees and the members of his family covered under the policy:

(a) All hospital facilities (except cosmetic surgery) will be provided free of cost to the employee, spouse, and two dependent children below the age of 21 years and dependent parents of the employee.

(b) The employees and their parents who are entitled under the ECHS or any other Medclaim policies shall avail the benefits of hospitalization through the ECHS/ Medclaim policies in the interest of the organization.

(c) Consumables, medicines and other items like dentures, spectacles etc., if provided by the hospital, will be charged as per actual.

(d) Any Lifesaving implants for only the employees till S-6 will be given at a discounted cost based on the discretion of the Medical Board.

4.2 In case of sickness/injury covered under "Occupational Hazards", the entire medical expenses shall be borne by the University subject to certification by the medical board of the Himalayan Hospital.

5. Procedure for availing medical benefits under the Health Benefit Policy

5.1 The employee who is entitled under this Policy shall be required to submit particulars with photograph of family members and dependents to HR Department for coverage under the

Policy. The HR Department, after verification of the records, shall issue a Hospital card authorizing for availing of health benefits under this Policy.

5.2 Separate cards will be issued to all the beneficiaries which shall be produced/shown at the time of availing health benefit facilities from the Hospital.

5.3 For availing the health benefits only prescriptions signed/counter signed by unit In-Charge will be entertained.

5.4 Duly Signed prescription shall be produced at the cash counter for claim and benefits.

5.5 A premium of Rs. 200/-, Rs. 250/- and Rs. 350/- per month shall be deducted respectively for employees under a, b & c category as specified in point no. 6 below for the Health Benefit Policy.

If both husband and wife are working and covered in this policy then premium will be paid by both. 6. Entitlement of wards Employee's entitlement of wards will be as under:

7. The Health Benefit Policy shall be followed in concurrence with Immunization Policy of the University, wherever applicable.

8. University reserves the right to interpret, alter, amend, modify, cancel or withdraw any provision made in this policy manual without any notice.

General Health Camps

The SRHU offers a vista of holistic health to its beneficiaries residing in its field practice area through its collaboration with Community Health Center, Doiwala, three own outreach Health Centrs viz. RHTC, Kurkawala, UHTC, Rishikesh, Haridwar and UHC, Ghamandpur, which are being used for teaching, training, research and community health work.

The dedicated faculty and staff are instrumental in channelizing National Health Programs by GOI into the general population. Apart from this, health and screening camps are conducted every month reaching the marginalized population.

SRHU team keeps a demographic record of the beneficiaries through family surveys and actively mobilizes community to raise their awareness via IEC activities including health rallies, nukkad natak, focused group discussions, health talks, quizzes, surveys, and health camps encouraging community participation. Monitoring and surveillance activities are routinely undertaken in the field practice area for a constant scrutiny of the health of our community.

The University over the years has successfully participated in and conducted:

- Awareness and surveys regarding national programs like National Vector Borne Disease Control Program, National Programme on Prevention and Control of Diabetes, CVD and Stroke.
- Active participation in National Programs and schemes eg. Measles-Rubella Campaign, Pulse Polio Immunisation and ICDS Monitoring in Uttarakhand where its efforts have been recognized and lauded by the Office of DGHS, Uttarakhand.
- Primordial prevention of lifestyle diseases through conduction of school health weeks.
- Encouraging community participation and providing Community diagnosis and treatment.

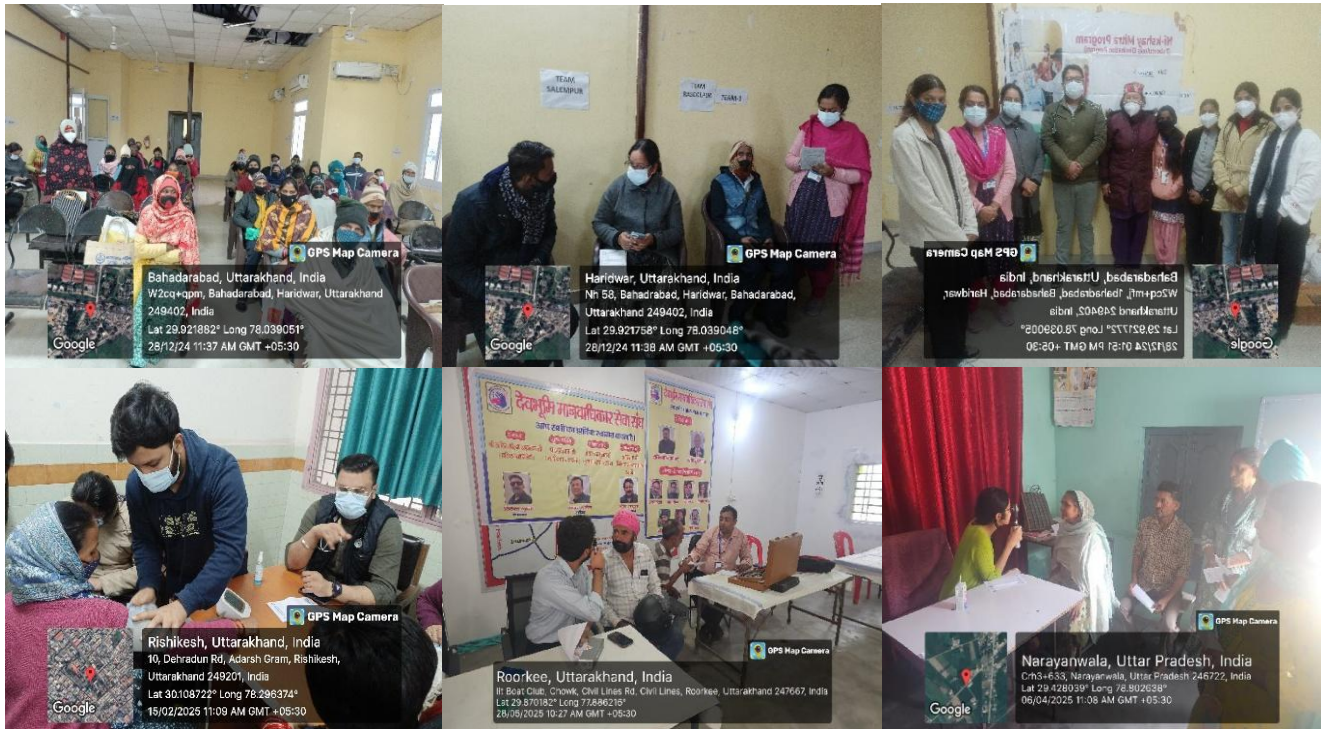


Figure 04: Images Presenting different timeline and place of Health Program conducted

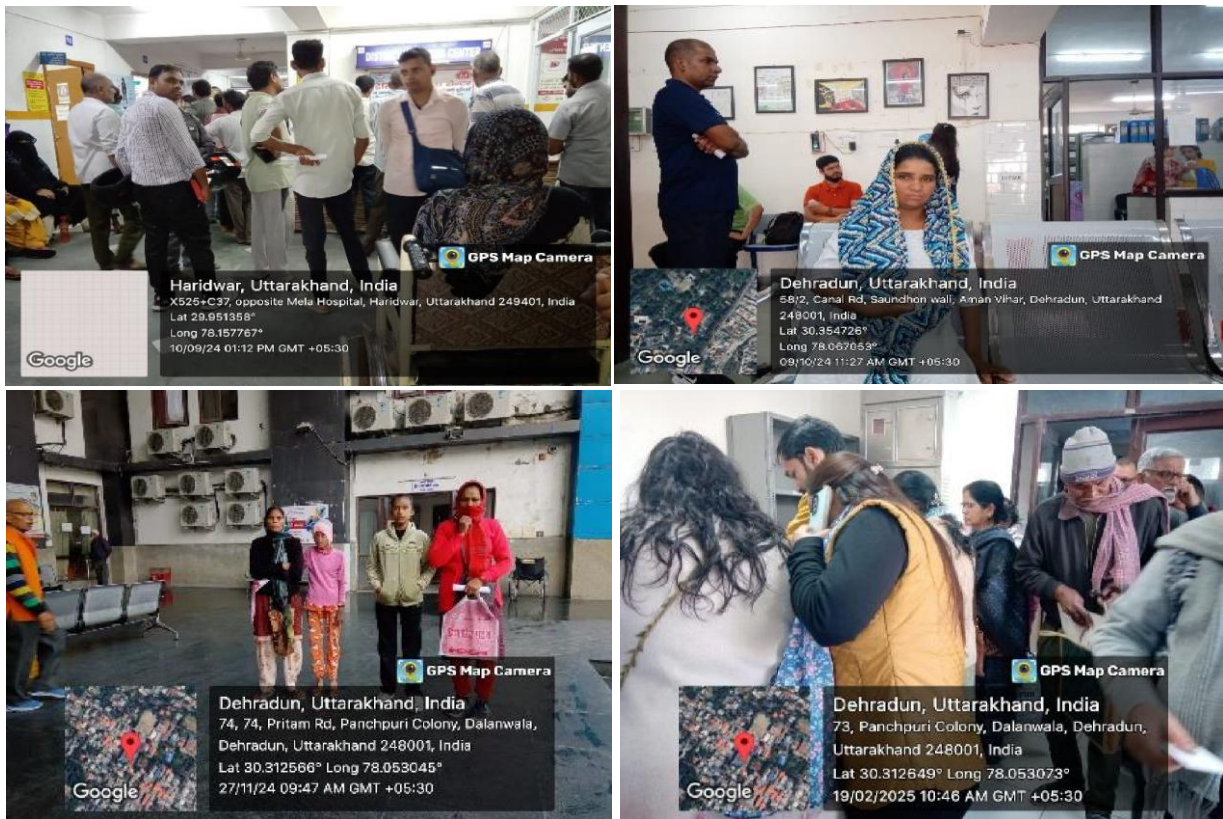


Figure 07: Images Presenting different timeline and place of Disability Certificate Program

Family Adoption Program

This program provides health benefits and to promote health awareness to underprivileged children of rural society. From preventive care and medical treatments to spread the health awareness and wellness programs, our health benefits package is crafted to address the specific needs of children, promoting their long-term physical, emotional, and mental health.

The 'Family Adoption Programme' is an initiative aimed at promoting community engagement and environmental responsibility amongst medical students. It encourages students to adopt families in rural and underserved areas, providing them with healthcare support and promoting health awareness. As part of this program, the students also undertake community-based projects to address local health and environmental issues.

Objective: The primary aim of the visit was to continue the Family Adoption Programme for MBBS students at HIMC, SRHU. This program serves as an opportunity for students to engage with local families, gather relevant health information, and contribute to community health.

3. **Health Check-up:** The students conducted basic health check-ups, including measuring weight, height, and recording vital signs. This hands-on experience allowed students to apply their theoretical knowledge in a practical setting.

Challenges and Observations: While the visit was successful in many aspects, some families were not available during the scheduled visit. Strategies for better coordination and communication with families need to be explored to maximize the program's impact.

Conclusion: The Family Adoption Programme at HIMs, SRHU bridges medical education and community health, involving both students and faculty for a comprehensive approach.

Ni-Kshay Mitra Program (TB Elimination Program)

The Ni-Kshay Mitra Program is an initiative launched by the Government of India under the National Tuberculosis Elimination Program (NTEP) to eliminate tuberculosis (TB) from India. The program encourages individuals, organizations, and various stakeholders to adopt TB patients and support their treatment journey. SRHU actively participate in all the related activities and organized programs in nearest rural and urban areas:

Key Features of the Ni-Kshay Mitra Program:

Adoption of TB Patients: The program allows people to support TB patients by adopting them. This support comes in the form of nutrition, medical supplies, and other necessary assistance that can help TB patients through their treatment and recovery.

Support for TB Patients: The main goal is to ensure that every TB patient gets the necessary support for their treatment. This could include financial aid, medicines, nutritional support, and counselling. The idea is to make the entire process more humane and accessible.

Digital Platform: The program uses a digital platform where donors can register themselves and provide support for TB patients. The platform tracks the patient’s progress and the support they receive.

Focus on Nutrition: One of the key areas where support is provided is in the form of nutritional aid. TB treatment can be gruelling and cause weight loss and other health issues. Proper nutrition helps in faster recovery.

Community Involvement: It also encourages community involvement where people can take the initiative to help those suffering from TB in their locality.

Rural Development Program

This allied unit of SRHU (under HIHT) plays a broad, multi-dimensional role, particularly in the Himalayan region:

Origins & Philosophy: Established by the Himalayan Institute Hospital Trust, guided by the philosophy “Love, Serve and Remember”, RDI focuses on integrated and cost-effective approaches to rural health and development

Core Focus Areas:

1. **Health:** Mobile medical services, capacity building of health workers, mother and child health, and IT-enabled counselling and healthcare delivery
2. **Education & Skill Development:** Scholarships (Swami Rama Scholarship), non-formal education (Flying Birds school), technical skill-building courses like tailoring, jewellery making, and handicrafts
3. **Water & Sanitation:** Community WASH interventions across 200+ villages, resource centers, national sanitation campaigns, and project partnerships
4. **Adolescents:** Health, life skills, nutrition, livelihood education; content developed and scaled under government schemes like SABLA; RDI is a national training provider under the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare
5. **Disability & Rehabilitation:** Setting up village-level disabled persons organizations, inclusive education content (e.g., Braille books on menstrual hygiene), and disaster relief and rehabilitation work
6. **Village Development:** Promotion of agriculture, livestock, off-farm vocations, women’s self-help groups, ICT integration in rural development, and institutional support for governance planning

Impact by Numbers (via Community Outreach):

- Supported 200,000+ women and 19,000+ children in health initiatives
- Provided health education to over 10,000 students and scholarships to 300+ children



Swami Rama Himalayan University

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- Implemented 200+ water supply schemes, introduced solar technology in remote areas, served 325+ villages, and installed 12,000+ sanitation units
- Engaged 110,000+ adolescents, developed content scaled nationally, and secured national training provider status

Formed 64 disabled persons' organizations, trained 800+ frontline workers and educators, supported 400+ people with disabilities, and aided 281 children from disaster zones

Launched free, employment-oriented courses like Plumber-cum-Electrician and Data Entry/Office Assistant; 30 students per course, aligned with National Skill Development Programme

Engaged in social responsibility outreach such as sessions on hygiene, empowerment, and "good touch–bad touch" awareness in schools

HIHT WATSON refers to the Water and Sanitation (WATSAN) department of the Himalayan Institute Hospital Trust (HIHT), which is now known as Swami Rama Himalayan University (SRHU). The WATSAN department was established in 1998 and is responsible for water conservation, sanitation awareness, and implementing sustainable water management solutions in the community and for SRHU's campus.

Watson, SRHU is working in social activities across Outreach 31 States / UTs & HKH Countries. More than 2000+ villages with 12 Lakh population are so far covered and 150+ major projects are currently implemented in the rural as well as urban areas
